and mental health, freedom from destitution and capacity to help others, all a foretaste here on earth of our glorious self esteem in Heaven. There's no money needed in the keeping of those commitments. But it does take cash to keep bodies and souls healthily and confidently on track. The 1,718 brave and willing persons don't have that cash. We have to find it for them. Lately that hasn't been easy. The effort has been unsuccessful enough that superiors are 2. demanding a cut back, as in "Sorry pals, we can't help you." So sad? sad? sad? No way!

Hip! Hip! Hooray! Make way! Ladies and Gentlemen, here come the new Lifelong Working Boys' Center Volunteers Committee.

They are a crew of life seasoned former year long volunteers still way down in or barely out of their twenties, able to sit up, take needed good life support from the hundreds of other former year long volunteers and pass it on to our folks here.

Here's what they are not afraid to face with the hoped for help from other former year longers. They-we need a total of two hundred thousand dollars for a month of 24 days' operations. Specifically for what? Sunlight, rain, clean air, daily mass or prayer time, belonging to the family of families and having a growing circle of friends are all free. The gas, electricity, water, cleaning supplies, repairing damages to the aging furniture and tools, salaries and supplies for

so many programs are items that have to be paid for out of the \$200,000.00. Of the 1,718 persons affiliated, some use more than others use of the two hundred thousand each month. If we took money as seriously as superiors do, we could expel the big spenders like the special or challenged members. But if we divise the two hundred

thousand by all the members, the daily average cost to the benefactors of each member's daily commitment to change is a bit less than \$4.75. That is the total amount paid for each member's share in the general utities just mentioned above plus each one's three good meals each day, education at some level from day care to adult ed, the excellent physical and mental gen-

> eral medical care (except for dental care which has already been ordered cut to save cash), odd family life expenses like lollipops etc. Yes, I said \$4.75. I also said "good" meals. And I said that dental attention has been cut. But we'll get all the cut necessities back for the poor as soon as the Lifelong Volunteers Committee get in touch with the others.

We do get accused of overspending on the poor people.



We don't stay within a budget which would be based on a guess of what gifts we'll get in any given month. We fall way behind in paying our employees promptly. They don't complain because, poor as they are, this is their contribution to other poor people. The King that we are following says His kingdom has

different rules than this world has. For example He told the disciples to feed a huge crowd of thousands with whatever they could scrounge from that kid with the five loaves and two fish he had on hand and that we can presume weren't gigantic lake water whales that would feed thousands.

DEAR FOLKS,

It was in the third week of May this year that we celebrated the feast of the Holy Trinity. In a faith session, we got to thinking and talking about how much of scriptural revelation is about the three divine persons participating in our human affairs. We reflected on how they

decided to get closer, having one of themselves live our situation, show us how to do it heroically. All of us owe it to the three of them in whose image we are created to try to feel and use their style. They're dedicated to thinking about and doing good for everybody else and in all four gospels they invite us to do the same.

It dawned on us, as we talked, that in our Working Boys' Center - A Family Of Families, we have a team of twenty-six adult "leaders" united in a mighty effort to accept that Divine invitation as a challenge to prove their love. Our leaders don't get paid anything for dedicating all their free time to the other members. They meet as a group once a week for mutual support. They don't vote each other into positions and powers in a chain

of command. They simply catch Christ's breathing the Spirit inspiring them to use each other's light and power. Like Christ with the apostles, each leader maintains a closer and often rough contact with about fifteen families keeping them alive their commitments.

They have to be simple and direct without being bossy. "The daily bath program is for every day, not for every now and then." "You missed adult ed class again." "You have to make that budget we taught you so you can save your weekly quota in the bank." "You were supposed to help in the kitchen yesterday." "I'm not a boss. I'm reminding you to change and become elegant and prosperous enough to help others like Christ wants!"

There's nothing even close to an attitude of superiority in our leaders. They feel their own childlike-ness helping the folks' guardian angels get their cooperation. We'll use space in the centerfold to meet a few of them.




Marcia Guerrero is the leader who lives the farthest away from Center Number One where she serves a long day. So her generosity, we can note in pass-


Vicente Romero starts each day in the Center at

mothers by teaching groups of kids, including her own, the prayers for mass, checking on their savings quotas in the Center's bank and making the daily bath program a fun activity with prizes for not skipping. She taught herself to read and write in order to keep records on all that. It's no surprise that she became a founding member of the recognized leaders' group. Well versed in the Bible, her shared thoughts on the passages read at the start of each leaders' meeting reveal a deeply felt happiness that we're God's kids.

Edison Alvear is our super-cop leader. He is employed



at the Center forty hours of the hundred hours he puts in supervising and counseling. Before the government started chasing working kids off their street work sites and out of shops where they had jobs, Edison spent his days visiting all the work sites. Not only the kids but also the customers and employers enjoyed his approval of good work and just wages.

Now that off-campus work for kids is prohibited, Edison supervises an in-house work training program of production of items for sale. All the working boys and girls know Edison's footsteps, his voice

and his standards of conduct. They also know that just the mention of his name prevents any bad treatment they might be threatened with any place in the city. Everybody needs a big brother.

Gloria Narvaez looks every bit the quiet, artistic, culture loving person that she is. Thanks to her efforts, our walls have attractive designs and



decorations accompanying the necessary notices and whatever, all elegantly executed. She adds class to all we do in the Center. That's her obvious contribution. But ever so much more valuable is Gloria's ability to attract new families into membership. In the hillside shack-towns around Center Number Two she engages folks in talk about the victory

that God expects poor people to win over the poverty and suffering He allows them to live in. She makes it beautifully obvious that, without any violence, she has won that personal battle by being a loving discipline in the Center's values. They can't help but be attracted to follow her class act.

Rocio Barrera and Miriam Chasiluisa have for years been co-directors of Center Number One. They're both mothers of families and have had no big problem about raising their own kids both at home and at the Center as circumstances have
