∠∠ oday we came out stronger than ever, even though we started with apprehension. Today we have achieved a goal" Kevin Aguirre, graduate.

Our third ever graduating class celebrated their accomplishments this month. We had a total of 18 students (8 young women, 10 young men). Six students graduated with a technical high school diploma, with a focus in metal mechanics, and 12 students graduated with a general studies diploma.

Seven honor roll students applied for the scholarship of the Pontificia Universidad Católica del Ecuador, and our metal mechanics students have internships with local companies.

We are so proud of these students' achievements, especially amidst the additional challenges they faced during the pandemic. We are excited for what the future holds for them and look forward to watching them continue to grow and learn.

Have you heard?

The Center was the focus of a recent documentary in partnership with The Papal Foundation and EWTN Vaticano TV. It was an honor to have the work of our staff and families shared on a large international scale.

Two EWTN filmmakers joined our community director and development director at The Center for two weeks to capture as much of our work, families, staff, and Ecuadorian culture as possible. They witnessed a Minga, when a visiting group, staff, and families helped lay the foundation for a family's home, interviewed staff and families, visited an offsite health fare, spent time in classrooms, in the sewing department, visited the original Center, and much more. As a part of filming, letters were written by our staff and hand delivered to the Pope a month later. When the filmmakers returned to Rome, they were personally touched by our mission and the families that we serve.

EWTN aired the documentary in five segmented episodes, which fully captured the 30-minute film. They also posted each episode and the entire film on their website.

The premier of the film took place this spring in Rome for the Papal Foundation, and another event was hosted with an abbreviated version in Colorado.

We will never be able to fully express our gratitude to the Papal Foundation and EWTN for making this film a reality.

When our dear Olivia asked me to reflect on the word *service* during my experience as a Center volunteer, I wondered what service was for me. "To love and to serve," as San Ignacio said, came to my mind. Love is to fix your eyes on others, to focus on them. Through affection, respect, and wishing their reality to be the best possible.

What is service for me? Service means loving what I do and showing love with my words, gestures, gifts, skills, and abilities. It means making the world a place where wounds are healed. It means putting in place the means by which the people around us can reach their potential.

So, I have come to realize that the question is not "What is service?" but "How do you serve?" It's doing things right and putting love in what you do, whatever you do, whatever you are.

I believe that the only thing that makes us serve is how, which is learned from experience. Accompaniment reframes service as a pursuit of mutual relationship through presence. When my intention is to accompany, I am focusing not on what I am doing or what results I am seeing in my work but rather on how I am being with the people around me. Am I taking time to connect with my students and community members by asking meaningful questions and actually listening to the answers? Do I share about myself in return? When I am told about or become aware of a difficult family situation, do I take a moment to enter into that sadness and challenge, so that the one experiencing it might feel a little less alone, as opposed to jumping right into discussing potential solutions? Am I allowing myself to wholeheartedly accept little daily opportunities and invitations to laugh, dance, and be myself with the people around me?

With this mindset, the service experience is deepened and takes on new meaning. It's not about just me or just you, but *us*. It is a real joy and privilege to be a part of us, something bigger than myself. And I begin to see clearly that I have just as much (if not more) to receive and learn as I have to give.

Meet Our New Provincial!


